Not only was it a great occasion at the time, but the real impact has been all that has happened since. The theme of 'make a difference' seemed to resonate with so many and we've received so many stories of individuals who met with God and have gone on to see new things unfold where they live and work.





'Make A Difference' was always

meant to go way beyond Ashburnham and that's exactly what's happened.

## FOLLOWING JESUS INTO THE MARKET PLACE

The Equipping Tracks at Ashburnham 2017 were a first for New Ground. From the feedback we've had, it was also the first time many people felt that their vocation, job, skills, work-place etc. had been identified as having a key specific role in the mission into which Jesus is calling us. There was a real emphasis on getting encouraged, equipped and trained to be more apostolic and prophetic where we spend the bulk of our waking hours.

Under the six domains identified - Business & Economy, Government, Health & Social Care, Education, Creative, Religions - we gathered over 300 people in six separate sessions. Some were oversubscribed and we sadly had to turn a few latecomers away; not to be put off, some enterprising folk turning up to the already packed out Business track decided to form a "company" outside the

open window of the seminar room. This shows true entrepreneurial spirit!

Believing that God equips each one of us through the Holy Spirit (Rom 12:6; 1 Cor 14:26) and that corporately we have the mind of Christ (1 Cor 2:16), we used testimonies from those among us and World Café techniques to facilitate the meeting of as many people as possible. Small groups had a short time to share and discuss experiences and ideas around specific themes such as "Where are the greatest opportunities to share Jesus using my skills?" and "Identify the key obstacles to presenting the Kingdom of God in your work environment". We finished with feedback from each table and an opportunity for prayer and ministry; now we're working on the feedback and material gathered in order to build on this initiative





A few areas are already apparent and the New Ground Core Team are seeking to progress these:

A number of people "found one another" at the Equipping Tracks; by this I mean some who feel isolated and discouraged in their work or vocational environment discovered they were not alone, others shared their concerns and challenges. A few walked into the room and found someone else from their own church who worked in the same arena! It is certainly the case that those in smaller churches or plants, and those with very specialized skills can often feel lonely and ill equipped to serve as a missionary in their normal working hours.

Many shared that they were beginning to appreciate the value and ability to contribute through their work and calling, which they were in danger of seeing as only a "means to an end". This shows that despite us having the values of Kingdom and community, it is still possible for many to see the church focused primarily on Sunday and small group gatherings.

There is a clear hunger for more engagement and interaction starting perhaps with the microcosm of issues only touched on at Ashburnham. As in all skills environments, missionaries learn best from other missionaries who are a few steps ahead in particular areas. Face to face learning is always best, and we are looking at how to facilitate other gatherings, but we can also supplement this in today's world by digital means. We hope to launch an online forum for each track domain with opportunity for cross-working where appropriate, which will enable all of us to keep in touch in real time across all our churches.



## IMPACTING COMMUNITIES

It was so encouraging at Ashburnham 2017 to hear some of the amazing and innovative ways that churches are seeking to serve and impact their local communities.

Of course, we were unable to tell all the amazing things that are happening across the churches and so have decided to keep sharing these inspiring stories to provoke us to consider how we can serve and reach the communities that God has called us to.

Jubilee Community Church in East Grinstead have a vision to make their church as inclusive as possible for as many people as possible in their community. With that in mind, they have employed Sarah Wallis, a specific Additional Needs Coordinator, whose role is to break down the barriers that stop people from attending church.

I spoke with Sarah about their vision to be a truly welcoming and inclusive church for everyone, regardless of any issues people may have relating to language, learning, age, disability or mental health.

Sarah was inspired to begin 'Jubilee Hub' – a weekly drop-in lunch – because she observed people on the fringes of church life, seeking somewhere to belong but finding church inaccessible. She recognised certain groups in her community underrepresented in their congregation. As someone who is a passionate believer that the gospel is inclusive to all, she decided to do something about it.

One of the unique features of the Hub is that it enables people who have experienced isolation





themselves to volunteer and help others, and this has resulted in people growing in confidence and generating ideas. These are some of the things people have said about the Jubilee Hub:

'I love coming here, I feel so relaxed at the Hub this is the highlight of my week.'

'This place accepts anyone, it is so unusual, I can't keep away!'

This regular gathering is now creating opportunities for Hub users to volunteer within the Jubilee Community Centre, for example with the catering team to provide meals for the work they do with elderly people. Each week they welcome an average of 25 adults to the Hub, but this is increasing week by week as word spreads and partnerships with other agencies grow. Sarah believes this is an easily replicable model for other churches.



#### SUSTAIN CAFÉ

Another initiative developed by Sarah at Jubilee is the Sustain Café; a drop-in café that runs twice a month for parents with children who have additional needs. The Sustain Café aims to be a little oasis in the parent's week where they can recharge their batteries and feel supported. Many of the families that attend are not from church, but the team pray for them and practically demonstrate Jesus' love.



Sustain Café has been running since March 2017, and went from meeting monthly to twice monthly in June. A core of parents (mums and dads) come each week and friendships are growing. They recently received a grant which meant they were able to provide Christmas presents for all the families that access Sustain Cafe.

Previously, we met every other Sunday and on Tuesday evenings. As of this month, we have stated meeting every Sunday. We love having fun together and have recently enjoyed celebrating Christmas and New Year together.

In November 2017, we celebrated Thanksgiving, a festivity that is normally not celebrated in The Netherlands, yet we thought it would be a great opportunity to share what we are thankful for in the midst of friends and family. It felt a bit like Levi who,

after deciding to follow Jesus, opened up his house and held a banquet for his co-workers and friends to meet with Jesus.

We had people from 'outside' joining us too. With two big Turkey's (prepared on the BBQ) and a table full of delicious food from different countries, we completed "I am thankful for ...." on a card and shared it with each other.

Besides being thankful for friends, family, provision and even certain children's TV programs, we were able to share about our thankfulness to God, that Jesus died for our sins, that we have a hope and that He is our joy and life.

The simplicity of opening up our homes, eating together and sharing our faith, makes us thankful for the freedom we have, and gives us hope for more opportunities to do so as we see His Kingdom advance in the great city of Maastricht.





# PLANTING CHURCHES BERLIN

Having the right perspective affects how we see things. Europe is spiritually dead, but friends, it is also ripe for revival! If we look at things from an earthly perspective and don't consider a heavenly one, we can easily lose heart.

It is said that Europe is the least evangelised continent in the world, where less than 4% of Europeans attend church regularly. Cities like Berlin and Brussels have less than 1% of the population attending church. It's important that we learn from statistics and consider the challenges that others have faced when sharing and contextualising the good news of Jesus.

After our last visit to Berlin, we felt a little overwhelmed by the spiritual climate and the weight of 'counting the cost'. We felt drawn to spend time in prayer and particularly praying Isaiah 40 over the church plant, the city of Berlin and ourselves. The next day we received a prophetic encouragement from Liz Rose who attended the prayer day in Berlin about 'eagles who fly on thermal wind, and seeing things from God's perspective' out of Isaiah 40 - we instantly received fresh faith.

God has called us to play our part in seeing Him glorified in Berlin, by starting a Bible-based, grace-filled, Spirit-empowered new testament church right in the heart of Germany's capital city. God continues to speak to us about doing something different, being radical, using creativity and technology, being a people of worship and of the nations.

As we prepare for our move to Berlin in April this year, we're reminder of Hudson Taylor, who first prayed from Brighton for 24 missionaries to join him in sailing to China for the 'China Inland Mission'. It's said that by 1939 CIM had over 1,300 missionaries, impacting thousands of Chinese people. It's estimated today that there are 85 million Christians in China. Hudson Taylor struggled to get the first 24 and could have given up, but chose to see things from God's perspective trusting and seeking Him faithfully to provide for what He had ordered. God has called us to Berlin and we are praying for 20 adults to join us this year on our adventure.

### REACHING NATIONS

There are 84 countries in the world for whom either French is an official language, or where French culture has a strong influence. Some estimate that as the African population grows, this will represent around one billion people within the next couple of decades. French is certainly likely to overtake German as the most widely spoken mother tongue in Europe by 2025.

We were privileged to be involved with establishing the first Newfrontiers church in France back in the mid 1990s. It still exists today as Église Espérance des Nations, in Rennes, the capital of Brittany. Since then, it has planted out into St Hilaire, a market town in Normandy, and is a great example of a healthy pioneering church in the French cultural context. As it stands today, New Ground represents around a dozen churches and plants in the Francophone world, which currently includes one in Geneva,

Switzerland. These are scattered mainly across the north and south of France, with nothing much to show in the middle/Massif Central area — but we're working on it.

Churches in Paris, Lyon, Montpelier, Le Havre, Nîmes represent the big cities, and we have churches in towns like Quimper and Valence too with populations of around 70,000.

The population in France is very different to the UK and thus requires a different approach to church planting and apostolic ministry. France has a higher population growth than most European nations yet a much higher proportion do not live in big cities like in the UK but in small communes of just a few thousand people. This means that our church planting strategy has to be more flexible and innovative, and we rely on the Holy Spirit to continually shape our ideas and plans.





#### NEW GROUND ACADEMY

Recently, New Ground Academy has been established in French with over 70 students currently enrolled in two hubs based in Paris for northern churches and Lyon for those in the south and east, including Geneva. This is an exciting strategic development as we need to raise more new leaders to continue advancing in mission by planting into cities like Nantes, which is next on the agenda.

### LAÏCITÉ

The church in France has known much persecution over the centuries, especially of Protestants, to the degree that the state has adopted the concept of laïcité since the revolution and declared itself totally secular over 100 years ago with the complete separation of church and state. Whilst many people remain nominally attached to the Roman Catholic Church, attendance is lower than that of the Church of England and declining fast.

### ACADEMY

Raising, equipping and releasing leaders is one of the many exciting things happening within New Ground. From the moment we launched the New Ground Academy in September 2014, God has continually surprised us with how big his plans are to use the Academy to train up leaders.



The first surprise was to see the number of people who signed up to our first intake in London, second was the multiplication into new bases in Edinburgh, The Hague, Paris, Lyon, Guernsey and launching in Romania early this year. In yet another surprising turn, we have seen a new base launch in Harare, Zimbabwe, hosting over 150 students in a nation on the brink of a new dawn?

But the biggest surprises have come in the shape of people. We've seen experienced leaders who didn't expect to grow as much as they have, and newcomers to leadership who weren't sure that they were qualified to come on the Academy, but who have grown beyond their wildest dreams. It's been such a privilege to be involved - maybe you would like to join us on the Academy too.
